## PATROL OPERATIONS DIVISION

Patrol Operations is comprised of 16 sworn officers under the leadership of **Captain James Shelhorse**. Officers are assigned to one of four squads, each led by a Sergeant, working 12-hour shifts. Patrol Operations handles all dispatched calls for service, conducts self-initiated enforcement activities and provides high visibility patrols in hopes to prevent and deter criminal activity.

#### **STAR Corridor Update**

Officers handled **14** calls for service in this area; completed **75** park, walk and talk activities as well as **21** hours of traffic enforcement and general observation time. Officers had **45** community contacts and conducted **8** roll call meetings.

#### **Patrol Highlights**

On March 5, officers responded to the 12000 block of Washington Hwy for a hit and run. Upon completion of an investigation, a subject was arrested for DUI.

On March 6, officers responded to the 100 block of N. Washington Hwy for a vehicle crash. Upon completion of an investigation, a subject was arrested for DUI and underage possession of alcohol.

On March 13, officers responded to the 12000 block of Side Saddle Lane for a domestic disturbance. Upon completion of an investigation, a subject was arrested for domestic assault.

On March 13,officers responded to the 100 block of N. Washington Hwy for a trespassing call. Upon completion of an investigation, a subject was arrested for trespassing, resisting arrest, assault on law enforcement, and an outstanding warrant.

On March 26, officers responded to the intersection of Arbor Oak and S. Washington Hwy for a hit and run. Upon completion of an investigation, a subject was arrested for felony hit and run.

On March 26, officers conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle in the 300 block of England Street. After an investigation, the driver was arrested for DUI.

# SPECIAL OPERATIONS DIVISION

Under the command of Special Operations Division, the **Investigative Unit** is comprised of three investigators led by **Captain Marie Kemp**. This operational component is responsible for the investigation of all felony and serious/repeat misdemeanor offenses reported to the police department. Additionally, this unit is tasked with proactive investigations into narcotics trafficking and other criminal behavior.

## Investigative Highlights

On March 1, an investigation was conducted into an unknown suspect who committed two larcenies at the Walmart. At the conclusion of the investigation, the suspect was identified and investigators obtained warrants for grand larceny and petit larceny.

On March 23, investigators obtained one grand larceny warrant for a subject who burglarized a business in the 10000 block of Design Rd. Investigators were able to arrest the subject on the same day.

On March 24, investigators obtained 15 separate warrants on three subjects for stealing catalytic convertors from vehicles throughout the Town. Investigators have located two of the subjects and served the warrants. One suspect remains at large.

On March 29, investigators located and executed warrants on a suspect who had outstanding warrants for past larcenies from motor vehicles that occurred in the town.

Interviews took place for the vacant investigator position. An officer was selected and will they will be reassigned on April 11. In preparation for their new role, they will have a training period with experienced investigators to learn basic investigation skills.

# **SPECIAL OPERATIONS DIVISION**

Under the command of the Special Operations Division, the **Crime Prevention/Logistics Unit** entails several functional components of the agency: Crime Prevention (1 officer), and the Auxiliary Unit (1 volunteer officers) and civilian volunteers all led by **Captain Marie Kemp**. In addition to duties tasked to individual members, this component is responsible for Recruitment, Selection, Training, Public Information, and IT Administration.
